

Education and Refugees


Together, protect refugee children and help them have a future

According to the UNO, at the end of 2016, more than 3.7 billions refugee children did not go to school. Less than 50% of them attended primary school, 22% middle school and only 1% college.

Adapted Aids

- Making an assessment of each child's abilities and knowledge
- Proposing an adapted teaching to enable them to have a job.

Peace

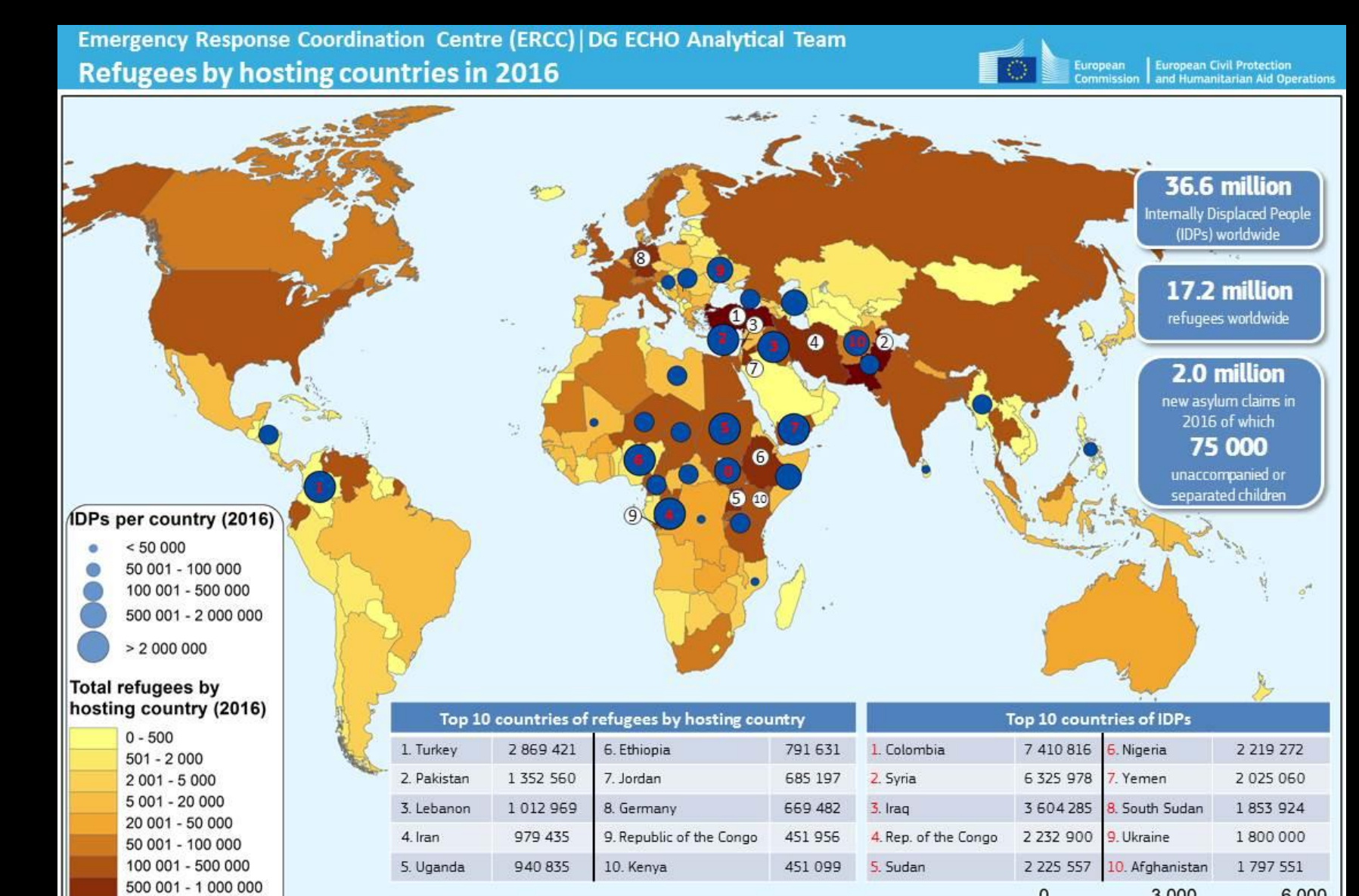
Preventing conflict
